

China in the Arctic: Debate at Arctic Futures Symposium

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China's Arctic activities have attracted growing attention from policymakers, researchers, and security analysts. Some experts, like Heather Exner-Pirot of the Observatory for Politics and Security in the Arctic, caution against overstating the risks, noting that China has limited experience and capabilities compared to established Arctic nations. Others, including Hans Jørgen Gåsemyr and Jari Vilén, emphasize the need to monitor Chinese engagement closely, particularly regarding infrastructure projects and potential strategic influence.

The symposium highlighted the complexity of the issue: while China's presence is often constructive and invited by Arctic states, it also requires transparency, careful negotiation, and thoughtful policy. The discussions underscored that awareness and informed engagement are essential as the Arctic evolves into a more globally connected region.

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
